The most recent addition to this list is The University of Texas at Arlington who made their debut at the Texas A&M Invitational in 2018. Most of the TGC members also attend the NAIGC annual National Championship competition. Since the NAIGC's establishment in 1989, the TGC has won 24 national team titles, with UT Austin and Texas A&M tied for the most number of men's championships, and Texas A&M with one more on the Women's side for the most women's titles. In 2018, the NAIGC National Championships will be held at the Fort Worth Convention Center.

For almost four decades the TGC has led the way as the preeminent state-wide organization. In the past couple years, other regions such as New York and the western coast have begun to follow in Texas' image, looking to the TGC as a role model in establishing their own state collegiate organizations.

Gymnasts who participate in TGC events form relationships and networking skills that last a lifetime. Our students have a better college experience, stay in shape, travel, and embrace the opportunity to promote the sport they love while continuing their athletic careers.
